Finance Responsibilities

Ohio Financial Reporting and Audit Requirement

- In 2015, the Ohio Auditor of State (AOS) clarified that the Ohio Administrative Code Chapter 117-2 required Special Improvements Districts to file a financial report each fiscal year with the AOS
- The financial report is required to be filed electronically through the AOS'
 Hinkle System within 60 days of year end if prepared on a cash basis or 150 days if prepared on a GAAP basis
- A notice of filing must be published in a newspaper in the taxing district noting the financial report is available for inspection
- AOS will perform an audit or agreed upon procedures (AUP) every other year
 - First 2-year cycle is audited followed by three 2-year cycles having an AUP before starting over again with an audit
 - Fees will be assessed for each engagement at \$41 per hour with a basic audit taking about 24 hours (\$984)
- Fines for not filing reports timely can be assessed up to \$750 annually





Finance Responsibilities

Approval Request:

- Engage OTRDM/3CDC at no cost to work with the AOS to:
 - Prepare and submit the Regulatory Cash Basis Annual Financial Report by the due date – 60 days after year-end (3/1/22)
- As the AOS will be performing an audit or AUP every other year, approval to not have an audit performed by an accounting firm

OTR DM Operating Budget – 2021

- Special Improvement District OTR South SID actual results allowed for additional funds to be paid to OTR DM for the delivery of services.
- **Community Partner Contributions** Contribution from Model Group (\$10M) above their property assessment.
- Environment: Beautification Decrease from budget related to winter maintenance for planters that will occur in January each year instead of December.
- Overhead Costs incurred for Imagination Alley Wi-Fi (\$2M) and general liability insurance (\$1M) are in excess of budget as well as legal fees (\$3M) related to researching legal liability regarding snow removal.

- In her free time, she likes to explore Cincinnati's gorgeous parks, spend time with friends and family, and snuggle with her cat.

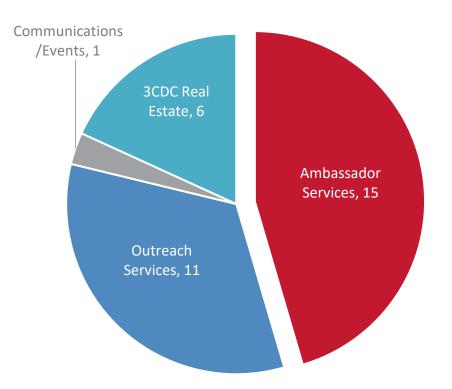

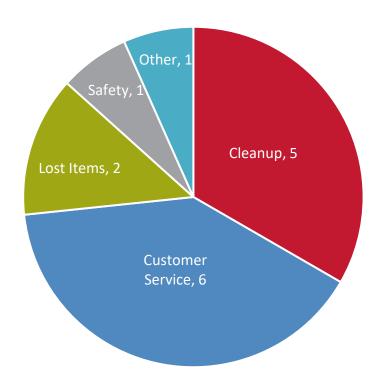

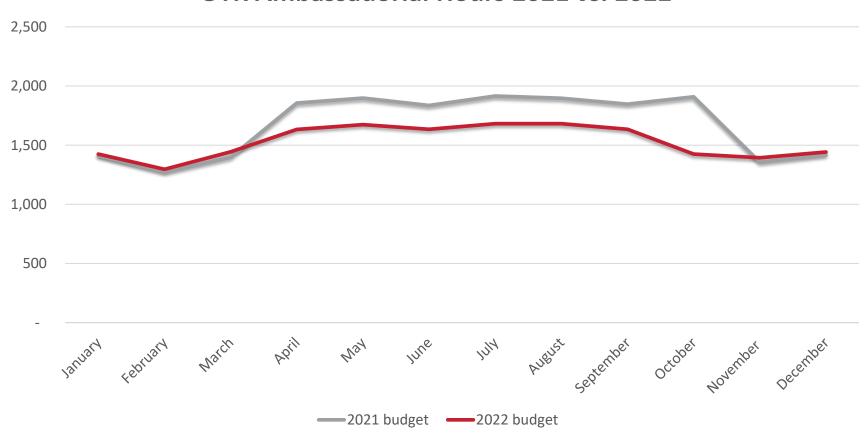

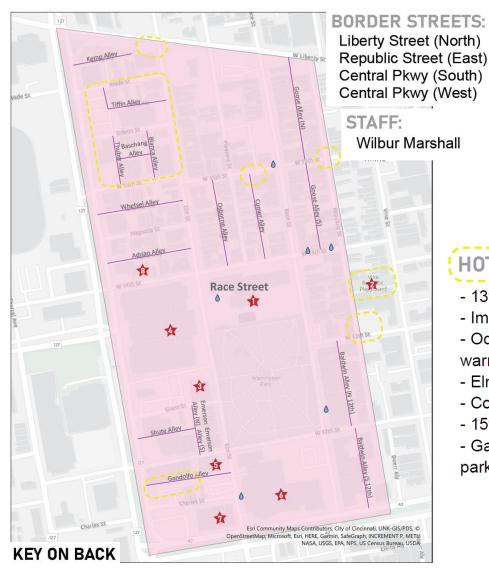

Snow Removal

- Snow event on Feb. 3rd & 4th:
 - 322 staff hours

- City responsible for snow removal on streets & remove according to priority system.





Graffiti Removal

- Special Projects team removed **69** tags in a 2-week span.
- Continue to remove tags as weather allows.

<u>Next Steps</u>: Meeting with partners to nail down event dates & discuss responsibilities.







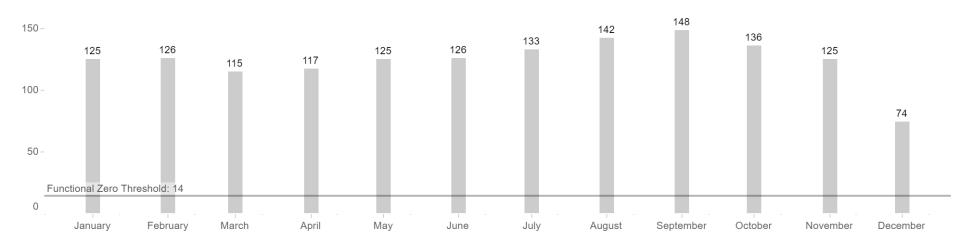

Actively Homeless Population Monthly count for All subpopulation(s)

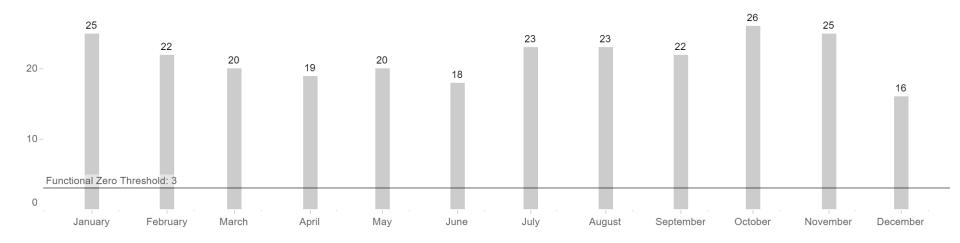

Actively Homeless Population Monthly count for Chronic subpopulation(s)

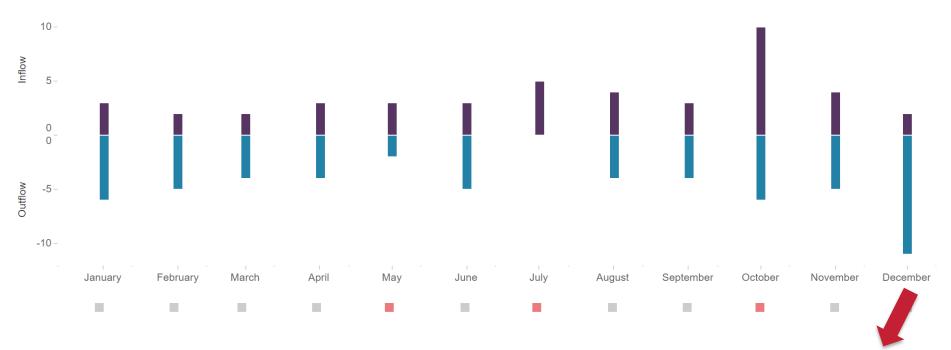
